This is a systematic review of 155 interventions published prior to 2001. All interventions involved children aged 0-14 years and were either designed to prevent accidents or to reduce their impact. In addition, they all included an outcome measure - such as changes in mortality or morbidity, or changes in observed or reported behaviour. Originally published by the Health Development Agency in the United Kingdom, this systematic review can now be downloaded from the National Institute for Health and Clinical Excellence (NICE) website. Though dated it remains a key reference document for injury prevention practitioners and a knowledge base on which subsequent researchers can build.

[Report] Coventry, UK: Warwick Medical School, University of Warwick, March 2007, 212pp

An appraisal of fallers' clinics launched by the National Institute for Health and Clinical Excellence (NICE) was suspended because of a lack of information regarding existing services and typology. This project aimed to determine the feasibility of conducting economic modelling to appraise fallers' clinics. To achieve this a national survey of services and reviews of the evidence of effectiveness of various models of fallers' clinics and screening tools were undertaken. The authors conclude that the limitation of the information available means that the effectiveness of various models cannot be confidently assessed and economic modelling cannot be recommended. In the light of this research, NICE announced on 2 February 2009 that fallers' clinics have been removed from its technology appraisal work programme - see second website link for details. NICE has published Clinical Guideline (CG21) The assessment and prevention of falls in older people' (see record no. 7752).

Authors conclusions: Frail older people confined to institutions may sustain fewer hip fractures if given vitamin D with calcium. Vitamin D alone is unlikely to prevent fracture. Overall there is a small but significant increase in gastrointestinal symptoms and renal disease associated with vitamin D or its analogues.

Calcitriol is associated with an increased incidence of hypercalcaemia.

This is a systematic review of 155 interventions published prior to 2001. All interventions involved children aged 0-14 years and were either designed to prevent accidents or to reduce their impact. In addition, they all included an outcome measure - such as changes in mortality or morbidity, or changes in observed or reported behaviour. Originally published by the Health Development Agency in the United Kingdom, this systematic review can now be downloaded from the National Institute for Health and Clinical Excellence (NICE) website. Though dated it remains a key reference document for injury prevention practitioners and a knowledge base on which subsequent researchers can build.
