This study examined the experience of the Christchurch Hospital in treating alcohol-related facial fractures over an 11 year period. Of the 2581 patients seen with facial fractures during the study period, 49% of the injuries were alcohol-related. Males accounted for 88% of alcohol-related fractures and 59% were males in the 15 to 29 year age group; 78% of alcohol-related fractures were due to interpersonal violence and 13% to motor vehicle accidents. 65% required hospital admission and 58% underwent surgery.

Authors' conclusions: "Parenting interventions, most commonly provided within the home using multi-faceted interventions may be effective in reducing child injury. The evidence relates mainly to interventions provided to families at risk of adverse child health outcomes. Further research is required to explore mechanisms by which these interventions reduce injury, the features of parenting interventions that are necessary or sufficient to reduce injury and the generalisability to different population groups."

This study analysed the demographic characteristics and hospital resource utilization of submersion-injury-related hospitalizations in the under 20 age group in the United States in 2003. Children 0-4 had the highest rate of hospitalisation. In this study, children with permanent injuries as a result of the submersion accounted for 5.8% of hospital admissions and 37.3% of hospital costs and in hospital deaths as a result of the submersion injury accounted for 11.6% of hospital admissions and 20.0% of hospital costs

This US study compared two types of smoke alarm - ionization or photoelectric - nine months and fifteen months after being installed in low and middle-income homes. Continued function, reasons for non-function and nuisance alarm rates were compared. Photoelectric smoke alarms had higher rates of functionality over both time periods. The most common reasons for non-functioning smoke alarms were disconnected or removed batteries.

This study examined the experience of the Christchurch Hospital in treating alcohol-related facial fractures over an 11 year period. Of the 2581 patients seen with facial fractures during the study period, 49% of the injuries were alcohol-related. Males accounted for 88% of alcohol-related fractures and 59% were males in the 15 to 29 year age group; 78% of alcohol-related fractures were due to interpersonal violence and 13% to motor vehicle accidents. 65% required hospital admission and 58% underwent surgery.
