This study explored the nature of adult supervision among farm injury cases involving children considering three relevant dimensions of supervision: (1) attention, (2) proximity, and (3) continuity. 354 cases on Canadian and US farms involving death or hospitalisation were examined. It was found that in a third of the cases what would in other circumstances would be considered adequate supervision was in evidence, suggesting that a new definition of adequate adult supervision within the context of the farm work environment needs to be developed.

This study indicates that falls after stroke are common and fall prevention programmes should be part of a stroke rehabilitation service. This report presents the findings from a community survey, conducted in Victoria, Australia in 2006. The survey aimed to gauge contemporary attitudes held by the community in Victoria toward violence against women, and to provide indicators of change in community attitudes since 1995. A total of 2800 persons were interviewed by telephone of which 2000 were randomly selected members of the general community (referred to in this report as the "main sample"), and 800 were members of four selected culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds (Chinese, Vietnamese, Italian and Greek), referred to in this report as the "SCALD sample". The report also presents relevant findings from focus group research which was conducted both within the general community and with Indigenous members of the community. The main sample findings and the findings from SCALD sample are summarised in articles appearing in the March 2007 (p.3-6) and June 2007 (p.6-10) issues of the CDFVR Newsletter respectively. It provides healing services to indigenous individuals and families affected by family and domestic violence, and sexual violence, with the goals of increasing safety and reducing harm within families. "The project idea came from literature about healing. The idea is that if you commence healing in an Indigenous community, it reduces the level of violence. Thus, healing refers to the impacts of historical and cumulative trauma, and broader issues of poverty, housing and health, as well as the specific problems of sexual violence and family violence."
