**The benzylpiperazine (BZP) / trifluoromethylphenylpiperazine (TFMPP) and alcohol safety study**

[Report] Wellington, N.Z. Ministry of Health, November 2006, 38pp.

To address the lack of information about the effects of BZP and its use in conjunction with alcohol, the investigators conducted a randomised double blind placebo controlled trial which assessed the effects of BZP/TFMPP alone and in combination with alcohol (six standard units). Cardiovascular parameters, psychological functioning, driving performance and delayed effects on sleep and mood were assessed. The study was stopped after 35 of the planned 64 subjects had undertaken testing due to concerns regarding adverse events. This report has only recently been made available on the National Drug Policy website. BZP became a Class C1 controlled drug on 1 April 2008 and possession will be illegal from 30 September 2008.

This study found that the data collected through the Canadian Hospitals Injury Reporting and Prevention Program (CHIRPP) was less likely to be representative for older children and more likely to capture children with more severe injuries. The limitations related to using CHIRPP for representing population-based injury remain fairly stable over time. The authors conclude that a one-time population-based sample can provide useful information to add to routinely collected injury surveillance.
