This report concerns deaths of children and youth (28 days to 24 years) for the period January 2002 to December 2005. Report analyses data for all causes of death in this age range including sudden unexpected death in infancy (SUDI), unintentional injury, assault, suicide and high risk or reckless behaviour where the intent is undetermined. Comparisons are made between Maori and non-Maori death rates. The Committee makes recommendations for prevention. See also the response from the Ministry of Health.

This study describes pregnancy outcomes for a population-based sample of New Zealand women, drawn from both urban and rural areas, aims to explore the relationship between lifetime experience of intimate partner violence and two non-birth pregnancy outcomes: miscarriage and abortion. The researchers found that women who had ever experienced intimate partner violence were 1.4 times more likely to report they had ever had a miscarriage and 2.5 times more likely to report they had ever had an abortion. This study was conducted by researchers at the School of Population Health, The University of Auckland and Family Planning in Hamilton.

This study explores the extent of intimate partner violence during pregnancy and its association with pregnancy intendedness and pregnancy-related behaviours among a representative sample of New Zealand women, drawn from both urban and rural populations. Women who had experienced violence in pregnancy, compared with those who had not, were less likely to report that their last pregnancy had been wanted at that time, and less likely to report that their partner wanted the pregnancy. Women who had experienced violence during pregnancy were more likely to have smoked during pregnancy. This study was conducted by researchers at the School of Population Health, The University of Auckland and Family Planning in Hamilton.

This bulletin uses data from the Queensland Injury Surveillance Unit (QISU) to examine injuries related to bunk bed use. Death records were also examined. The data indicates that bunk beds account for one percent of all injury presenting in children under 14 years of age to emergency departments in Queensland. 77% of the fall injuries resulted in a fall from a height of over 1 metre.
